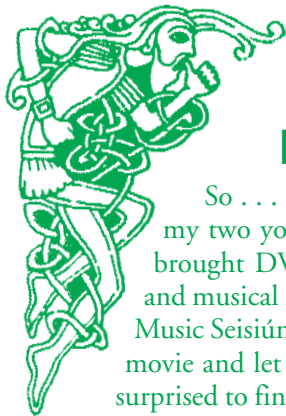
Hire a Hibernian
